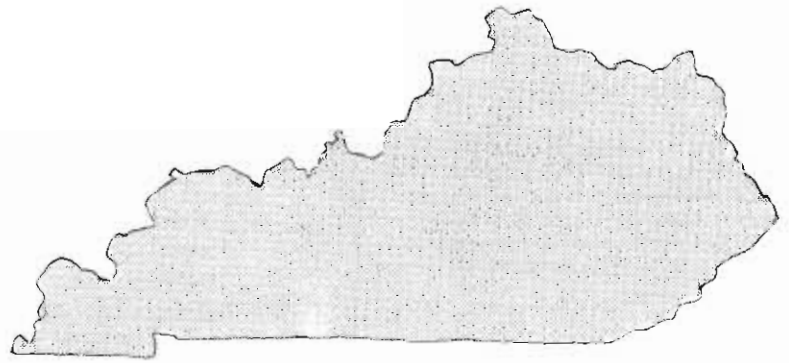

There are critics of the church who accuse us of being impossible in our standards and unrealistic with our expectations. They listen to what we preach and charge that no one is able to equal its criterion. But God has set supernatural standards and expectations because He provides supernatural power.

If we are struggling and feel frustrated in our spiritual life then we must ask ourself if we are employing that power. And, if we are not using it, how do we begin to utilize it?

I believe that our amount of power is directly related to the grip we have on God. A weak grip and there is little power. A strong grip and there much power.

Some people have a **formula** for gripping God. They reach for Him through the service program or their own spiritual schedule. God is defined by a program and His power by custom.

There are some who have a **formal** grip. Every time they touch Him they act as if they are meeting a stranger. They test the grip to measure His strength but do not take advantage of what they discover.

Still others reach with a **furtive** grip. They want to slip into God's presence and grasp enough power for the immediate need and disappear without being notice. They have no constant source

of power but wait until emergencies exist.

Some even come to God with a **frivolous** grip. Everything with God is fun and games and they never get down to business. They want God's power for the good times but want no demands made of them.

But, the grip we need to have in order to have the supernatural power to match

the supernatural standards is a **firm** grip that is steady and persistent. A grip that draws upon God's power for every step that is taken, the little steps and the big steps. Then, while others complain about impossible standards and unrealistic expectations, we'll be living it because we'll have God's power working in our life.

to go on.

The events that have transpired in the religious world of tele-evangelists and the electronic church during the past few months have made most people aware of the magnitude of dollars that have been supporting these programs. As the media has stated, these ministries are going to be scrutinized very closely in the future by their own internal auditing and accounting methods as well as by the Internal Revenue Service.

Good will come from all of this publicity! It will make the promoters of this type of programing much more careful in accounting for monies received. It will make more people selective in their giving to such ministries. But, probably topping the list, will be a return to God's plan and method of giving to the support of the local church. With millions of dollars going to such ministries in the past no doubt this has caused the local church to suffer. There will be a turn around for the better!

God's plan in Israel's history for the support of the Levites was the tithe of the eleven tribes. The Levites had no land to make a living, just 48 cities throughout Israel in which to live and occupy. The people of the eleven tribes were to bring their tithe to strategic locations throughout Israel and distribution was made to the Levites for their support.

Today, God's plan is the local church. Each person is to bring their tithes and offerings to their own

local church. Here the pastor is supported by the tithes, and the offerings are to be used for the various needs of the church. The Missions programs, both Foreign and Home, are to be supported by the pledges and offerings of the people in the local church. The concerted effort of the local church cares for the needs both locally, district wide and internationally. Everything must come through the local church.

Remember, the care is lacking, the personal touch is not there and the future is bleak when you really need someone to touch you and care.

Your dollars are valuable to you. You are the steward of your money. Place your money where you know the pastor and people. Give your donations to programs that are accomplishing the desired results. Bring all your tithes and offerings into your local church for its support and programs. You will be happy as the local church ministers to your needs, visits the elderly and shut-ins and makes everyone feel a vital part of the church. Then you know where your money is going.
