MOVING Pictures The Miracle in Manchester

I Thessalonians 4:18


"Sticks and stones may break my bones, but words will never hurt me!"

You learned long ago that the words to the above rhyme are not at all true. There is destructive power in words. Chances are good that you remember the cruel words that were hurled at you in a fight or disagreement more clearly than any physical blows you might have received. Unlike the bruises and cuts that one sustains in a fight, words leave wounds that heal slowly and leave deep, tender scars; sometimes for years, sometimes for life.

In contrast, Paul's challenge in I Thessalonians gives us hope that positive words also have power. The Word of God and the Good News (Gospel) found in the Word have a way of reassuring us, comforting us, exciting us. The most foolish thing we could do with the Word of God is to do nothing with it. The worst thing we could do with what God has said is to remain silent about it. He has spoken, and those spoken words offer hope, promise, comfort, cheer, reassurance, answers, direction, and so much more. Yet, if we do not speak those words to someone, will the needed words ever be heard?

As the Kentucky District News moves toward the end of one more year, and the threshold of another, it is our hope that it will serve as a forum for encouraging all who read it. We readily accept Paul's challenge to continue broadcasting and publishing the words that people so desperately need to hear. Ben Fugate burned a strong desire to see a church enabled Pastor Fugate to walk in the old built which would impact the city of Manchester, and ultimately all of Clay County.

Since those first months, however, Pentecostals of Manchester has seen the youth group expand; in their August youth service there were around 40 young people in attendance!

That's an impressive accomplishment for an established church, and a miracle for a church that just opened its doors just over two years ago.

They are clearly committed to seeing a gathering of the harvest in Manchester. The church started as a daughter work under Pastor Eugene McIntosh of Hazard. Bro. Fugate and his family soon moved to Manchester to be closer to the work. Bro. Ben is now starting a business close to the church, making videos of weddings, anniversaries, church services, and other events that people will want to record and remember. In addition, he's focusing on a variety of artistic needs including church promotions, wall murals, and graphic arts.

Their lives are centered around the growth and ministry of the Pentecostals of Manchester church.

Behind that growth and ministry is

movie theatre, piled high with trash and old movie equipment, its walls darkened floor to ceiling and see instead the future home of an Apostolic Church.




View of the main floor auditorium and balcony, from the platform. The left-hand side of the balcony that's enclosed will be the youth service room.

Middle: Pastor Wesley Fugate readies the paint in the sanctuary.








Our Section I goal was \$8,000. We reached our goal because many reached

Have you seen His coat of many colors He wears?


Have you heard Him whisper "I love you" as He covers us with a blanket of snow white?
