

Editorial ...

THIS IS December, the last month of what may be recorded by history as one of the most eventful years of human history. Certa'nly, it has brought much relief to us here on this continent and to others of the Allied Nations who have been victorious over the enemy, but it has not brought victory over the strife torn world in many other ways. However, it seems certain that 1945 has been one of the turning points in human history, to say the least. Actually, two great wars have been brought to an end, millions of men in the service of many nations have been returned to their homes and families. Therefore, with gratitude we bow our hearts to God, thanking Him from whom all blessings flow that our boys will not be required to spend weeks in fox holes, in snow and cold, but may at least have a warm place in which to sleep at night. At this the end of the year let us not forget to humble ourselves before God, and give Him the glory for that which we have been delivered from.

While we meditate on our present circumstances let us remember that there are untold millions who are living in the worse kind of poverty imaginable; starvation will be the lot of a great multitude. Are we forgetting that these are souls for whom Jesus died? Some may say. They are our enemies; true they have been our enemies, but God has commanded us to love our enemies. This however, is not the end of the matter for there are other things to consider. You may say, And what else is there to be considered regarding these nations? In an effort to answer this question is the outstanding fact that Nazism is only the logical results of Materialism, and if it had not been for the spiritually minded people (the salt of the earth) in our own land, we would have been the same kind of brutes that we hear of our enemies being.

Today, in the nations known as Christion Nations, there is a very definite trend toward Materialism in the Church. Many have long ago forgotten that it is not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit, saith the Lord of Hosts. The tendencies are away from Pentecost, and on toward Laodicea, that cold, heartless, selfish, self-satisfied, rich, but spiritless church. The attitude is simply this, We are able to take care of ourselves, we have money, education, organization and with these material things we can get along. The power of God is denied; it is

a bloodless religion, without the Holy Ghost, and the Bible as the Word of God is rejected in part or in whole. With this attitude, men who are sinners to the man, become brutes and beasts; instruments of Satan and destroyers of all that is noble and worthy of the best that God would impart unto us.

Pentecostal people, we must win the peace. The nations who have won the war are losing the peace, for the oppressed peoples of Europe and Asia will be filled with greater hatred than ever before, and will long remember our bombs and tanks; in the midst of surrender there will be greater inward resistance against us. It is even so at times in congregations, we win against the outward enemy, and have great revivals bringing in many souls, then comes the great tragedy of losing the peace among ourselves. The Scriptures admonish us to be at peace among ourselves, and if we fail in this, we are greater failures than we realize. A congregation without the peace of God will become a bitter gathering of carnal people, and die as surely as the Bible says, If ye live after the flesh, ye shall die.

The peace among the nations cannot be won by force, and it can only be the results of love among the people. This, a world that is full of bitter memories, and void of the Holy Ghost can never achieve: for the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us. The world does not have it, sinners do not have it; it is not natural to love ones enemies. This love that is so sorely needed is given of God, Ye must be born again to possess this love. The Holy Ghost is given, then the love of God is shed abroad in our hearts, but first we must receive the Holy Ghost. Only by the Holy Ghost can we truly have the peace of God, for the kingdom of God is righteousness, and peace, and joy in the Holy Ghost.

Again, it is not enough to have received the Holy Ghost, but Paul admonishes us with these words, Be ye filled with the Spirit. That is to say, once ye have received the Spirit, walk in the Spirit, be led of the Spirit, For as many as are led by the Spirit of God, they are the sons of God. Our sonship is not merely based on some named experience, but on the fact that we are led by the Spirit of God; if we will always keep this in mind it will help us to live at peace among ourselves, and then are we truly the sons of God.

In Bethlehem

"AND THOU Bethlehem, in the land of Juda, are not the least among the princes of Juda: for out of thee shall come a Governor, that shall rule my people Israel."

Great is the eternal plan of God. Bit by bit and time to time God revealed an isolated portion of His great plan of Salvation to His holy prophets.

The entire scheme of God's plan centered around a person who was to be born. And in this person all of God's intentions for the human race would be consummated.

His person was to bruise the serpent's head; and also by the serpent have His heel bruised.

It was finally revealed to Abraham several hundred years later that it would be in his seed (even Jesus) that all nations of the earth should be blessed.

As time passed on it was made clear that this seed or person would come out of the tribe of Judah, the fourth son of Jacob by Leah. It is prophesied at this time that this person is to have a sceptre, which suggests rulership; and He was to be a law giver; and unto him shall the gathering of the people be.

The revelation is progressively showing some new phase of the life, person, and position of this coming person as Redeemer, Ruler, Lawgiver, etc.

Balaam calls Him the Star out of Jacob, the hope that Israel could look forward to.

Moses boldly prophesies that He will be a Prophet from the midst of thee (Israel) of the brethren, like unto me. Moses further stated the words of God would be in His mouth, and for Israel to hearken unto those words. And did not Jesus say: "For I have not spoken of myself; but the Father which sent me, he gave me a commandment, what I shall say, and what I shall speak."

Witness after witness has spoken of Jesus with prophetical exactness; each witness testifying of that part of the revelation concerning Jesus, that God had given them.

David calls Jesus Anointed — King — Son and other such titles. And to David is the promise given that Jesus will come out of his loins and sit upon his throne. This prophesy points to the millenial reign of Jesus in the not too distant future, if the signs of the times are any proof.

A close scrutiny of the Scriptures alluded to heretofore, make it manifestly clear that the human side of Jesus is the only revelation being given. That is up until the time of Isaiah who calls Jesus "Immanuel" (God with us).

The revelation becomes clearer. The vague line of truth begins to brighten with divine lustre and brightness. The miraculous is now being associated with the normal human expectations concerning Jesus. Why Isaiah! "You intimate that a virgin shall conceive and bear a Son." Amazing! Stupendous! Mystifying! Here it is revealed that a vrigin, not an ordinary married woman, is to have a child. Well, this is sufficient to curb any more wishful thinking on the part of any future wife anxiously hoping that she will bring forth the Messiah!

Not only a miracle birth by a virgin; but the person is to be more than a great man: prophet, judge, lawgiver, king, son of David; He is to be called God with us (Immanuel Matt. 1:23).

Slowly through the ages the light of prophecy continuously pressed its way through the jungle of sin and idolatry. One could see it flicker its ray of hope—then fade behind a hill or a patch of heavy timber out of sight. Periods of darkness as Israel would move into sin, idolatry, and captivity. Then a prophet would catch a fresh glimpse of Jesus closer and brighter than when the last prophet spoke.

Isaiah takes a closer look at this Immanuel and then in the Spirit elucidates the first announcement with a second prediction. "For unto us a child is born, unto us a son is given: and the government shall be upon his shoulder: and his name shall be called Wonderful, Counsellor, The Mighty God, The Everlasting Father, The Prince of Peace" (Isa. 9:6).

With a spiritual perception far beyond that of by gone prophets Isaiah boldly startles the whole family of Israel with a prophecy that places Jesus as God Himself. This revelation has been clouded over by human speculation of modern day teachers; but the message of the absolute Diety of our Lord Jesus Christ is still ringing out from hundreds of pulpits with renewed vigor and intelligence. May God endue us with His power to turn the theological lack of human speculation over, and preach that Jesus is more than man—He is also God!

The text we have taken is from a prediction made by Micah. Micah states that Jesus is to be born not only in Judah, but in a special town of Judah— Bethlehem!

Bethlehem! a small town. It was here that Jacob buried his beloved wife Rachel. The name Bethlehem means the house of bread. And surely it was here that Jesus the bread of life that came down from heaven was presented to the world as a babe in the arms of His virgin mother.

Mary was not divine—just a humble little daughter of David; but she was exalted to the grand privilege of bringing forth the world's only Savior.

It was Boaz, a mighty man of wealth, who married the humble Gentile widow from Moab called Ruth. Boaz was a great man in Bethlehem. And by the way Boaz is a beautiful type of the Lord Jesus—and Ruth a pre-picture of the Church which consists of Gentile peoples of every nation, as well as Jews who have accepted Jesus as Kinsman-Redeemer.

Here in Bethlehem Samuel finds David as a young lad and anoints him with oil as king over Israel in the place of rejected Saul. When Samuel anointed David the Spirit of the Lord came upon David from that day forward.

At the same time, however, the Spirit of the Lord departed from Saul, and an evil spirit from the Lord troubled him.

So it can surely be seen that Bethlehem is a small town of some import.

David's father was named Jesse. He was in turn the Son of Obed. Now Obed (continued on page 12)

Of all the people in this world, the backslider must be the most wretched. I have known many thousands of persons in all parts of America, men and women in all walks of life, but the most unhappy men and, women I know are those who have wandered away from God.

I pray that every one of you who has strayed from the good shepherd's fold will give earnest heed to my every word, and quickly find your way back to God.

Let us first seek the answer to this question: Will God receive backsliders again into His fellowship, And does He want them to return unto Him?

Mal. 3:7: "Even from the days of your fathers ye are gone away from mine ordinances, and have not kept them. Return unto me, and I will return unto you, saith the Lord of Hosts."

The entire nation of Israel was gone away from God, but they were not conscious of their dangerous condition.

God said, Ye are gone away from mine ordinances.

To go away from the ordinances of God is to go away from God, for God meets men in the ordinances that He has ordained.

The entire nation had backslidden from God. They had robbed God in their failure to bring to His house the tithe that was the Lord's. Only by returning and restoring their tithes and offerings to God could Israel come back to God.



Hard Preaching

A wise minister usually tries to get his audience warmed up in some way or manner before he begins to hammer the gospel home. This is especially true if his message is along lines generally called Hard Preaching, by which is meant that he is forcefully driving home to the hearts of the hearers a message on the lines of holy living. Forceful and hard preaching in a cold audience is like a blacksmith hammering cold iron. You can shape cold iron, but it is so much easier to mold it when it is hot; to hit cold iron with sledge hammer blows may break it instead of shaping it into whatever is desired. Let us always remember to do our best to get our audience warmed up good by prayer and worship, and some good illustrations of the love

Jesus said that we should, Make disciples of all nations, and to do this the prejudices must be removed and the emotions aroused before the Word of God can get into the human mind and heart. The reason is that the Lord works only when our emotions are aroused and conviction grips the heart.

Jesus in His teaching used many illustrations to appeal to the natural mind, then brought spiritual truths home to the hearts of the hearers. He aroused their mental and emotional appetites so as to give and feed them the bread of life. He always took advantage of the circumstances and opportunities, such as sowing, fishing, meals and fasting. It was during one of the feast days (while the people were fasting) that He gave those wonderful words of truth in John 7:37-39, In the last day, that great day of the feast, Jesus stood and cried saying, if any man thirst let him come unto me and drink. He knew that the people were hungry and thirsty for they had had nothing to drink that day, and no doubt it was hot and dusty. Many believed in Him because of the saying.

When we preach the crucified Christ we should endeavour to have a crucified life ourselves and have a humble and contrite spirit. Jesus said that He was meek and lowly and His disciples should be the same. We must not drive and whip the people, but as a shepherd lead them with kindness-cattle are driven, sheep are led. Do not try to rule your congregation with an iron fist, or hand, or with harsh and stern words, have love and compassion as your Master had, for He was the embodiment of love, tenderness and compassion.

Speaking in Jongues

AS THE EVIDENCE OF THE BAPTISM IN THE HOLY SPIRIT

By Howard Carter

ON SEVERAL occasions and in various parts of the world, the writer has been asked if the speaking with other tongues is actually the evidence of the Baptism with the Holy Spirit. The earnestness of the inquiries has always carried a strong appeal.

An uncertainty rests in the minds of many people concerning this important matter. Some would affirm that there is no scripture that actually states what the evidence of the Baptism with the Spirit is, while others, dogmatically affirm that there is no other satisfactory evidence for this wonderful experience, except the speaking with other tongues.

Perhaps a personal testimony will not be out of order.

Thirty-one years ago, when I was seeking for the Holy Spirit, I well remember how keenly I opposed one of the leaders of the movement who affirmed that speaking with tongues was the only evidence of the Baptism. I carried my opposition into my seasons of private prayer and would petition the Lord to baptize me in the Holy Spirit with-

out the speaking with other tongues. It almost seemed, at one time, as if the Lord in mercy had considered my infirmity and was giving me what I was actually seeking.

I had waited for some years, and it was in the year 1914, in a day of prayer, that the Holy Spirit came mightily upon me, shaking my whole being from head to foot for a period of about twenty or thirty minutes. A greater manifestation of the power of the Holy Spirit I had never experienced before nor have I since, and I felt that at that moment I could have spoken with other tongues, but the thought came to me that this would be the opportunity to prove whether the speaking with tongues was actually the evidence of the Baptism with the Spirit or not, and as the power of the Spirit was passing so gloriously through my physical frame, I breathed the inward prayer that I should speak in tongues if it were the evidence of the Baptism, and that I should not speak if it were not. The experience passed away without any utterance in other tongues.

For a time, this was conclusive evidence to me that the speaking with other tongues was not the evidence of the Bapt'sm, and this incident was often related. Nevertheless, I had no satisfaction in my spirit. When people asked me if I had received the Holy Spirit, I would confidently affirm that I had, yet in my spirit I felt a lack. I had an experience that I was looking back upon, quite definite and remarkably wonderful, yet not wholly satisfying. It was as if I

dence of the Baptism with the Spirit and the only satisfying evidence there can

While traveling round various countries I have had the opportunity of praying with thousands of seekers for the Holy Spirit. For my own personal benefit I have recorded in my diary the number whom the Lord has baptized with the Holy Spirit. Among the great number already recorded, are the white, black, yellow and brown races, upon whom the Lord has poured out His Spirit, for I heard them as evidence, speak with other tongues and magnify God!



had seen a great deluge of rain falling over a country parched by the sun and greatly refreshing it for the time, but leaving no river flowing through it. I certainly had a testimony of what God had done for me, but I lacked the testimony of what God might have continued doing for me.

In dire need, I cried to the Lord for a more satisfying experience, and the cry of my heart was met a year later, when I actually began to speak with other tongues. From that day on in the year 1915 to the present, I have never ceased to speak with other tongues. In other words: Not only did the showers of blessing fall upon my dry and barren heart, but a river has flowed ever since, from which I have been able to slake my thirst daily.

My own experience, therefore, testifies to the fact that the speaking with tongues is without any question the evi-

Now it would be very difficult for one who spends so much of his time in what we call "waiting meetings" seeking the Lord to baptize His people with the Spirit, if there was no definite experience to mark the incoming of the Holy Ghost. If, for instance, I asked the people to receive the blessing by faith, I could easily see tens of thousands of people willing to take this step by faith and testify afterward to

having received the Spirit. But to me, this would not be enough. I might on the other hand ask them to wait for a definite experience, such as I myself had in the year 1914, when the power of the Spirit mightily shook me. But still, in some instances I would be perplexed and wonder whether the shaking that a person received under a mighty unction was sufficient to justify the claim that they had received the Spirit. But when I wait, as I always do, for the seekers to speak with other tongues before I accept him as being baptized with the Spirit, all doubt leaves my mind when I hear them receiving this like gift as believers received at the beginning of my Christian dispensation.

Therefore, the speaking with other tongues is the only satisfactory evidence that I know of for accepting a seeker as being filled with the Spirit.

This has been a very well organized camp, so we have had a much easier two and a half years than other camps. The planes are making so much noise overhead.

"You may know that we were ordered to leave Wuchow. We obeyed the government orders and went to a village west of Wuchow, and just arrived two days before the Japanese troops passed through the village we lived through it through the village, we lived through it all, but lost everything we had.

"We were run into the mountains and stayed there for three days and nights with nothing to eat; to add to our diswith nothing to eat; to add to our discomfort it was rainy and the wind was biting cold. We suffered unspeakable distress, with no one to go to but God in prayer. We could look to the Lord for help (Psa. 121:1), and He came to our help. The last day we had a meal with a rich man, Praise the Lord! What a good friend a wonderful saviour we a good friend, a wonderful saviour we have in Jesus; yes, Almighty God, O how I love Him!

"After that we came back to the village-we had nothing to eat, nothing to

do, and no money, but we earnestly prayed to the Lord and waited for His provision. We knew that we have everything in Christ, and all we have to do is to lay hold on the promises of God to receive the bread of life from heaven (John 6). Finally we felt that God had (John b). Finally we felt that God had answered our prayer. The rich man gave us a Taam of rice (about 125 pounds) and some vegetables. Since that time we get money from watch repairing and praying for the sick, which has kept us alive until now. We are all well, Oi Chan or Sally Ann is grown up considerable.

Resolved, That all Pentecostal Assemblies of Jesus Christ and The Pentecostal Church, Inc. Credentials, Licenses and Fellowship Cards be recogn zed until the unifying of these is completed.

Resolved, that the Title of District Chairman be changed to District Superintendent.

Also, a complete Sunday school policy was adopted which will appear in the Discipline of the United Pentecostal Church. This will be published at the earliest possible date, and will not, therefore, appear in the Herald as stated in November issue. New Credentials, Licenses and Fellowship cards also will be mailed out to all members in good standing with either the former Pentecostal Assemblies of Jesus Christ, or the former The Pentecostal Church, Inc. In the meanwhile all 1945 Fellowship Cards are good.

This unifying of the two bodies has been one of the greatest steps ever taken by the Pentecostal people, and our prayer to God is that we shall continue to work for the unity of all good clean brethren, but we are especially interested in each one working for a greater peace and harmony among ourselves than we ever dreamed could be; let us all do our part, and God will cause us to flow together with the love of God shed abroad in our hearts by the Holy Ghost which is given unto us.

was the first child born to the marriage of Boaz and Ruth.

When one traces the progressive steps of prophecy as it pointed to Jesus we can see the following outline:

- (a) A vague statement concerning the woman's seed bruising the serpent's
- (b) A promise to Abraham of a seed, and in this seed the blessing of Abraham would fall upon the gentiles. (Eph. 3:14).
- (c) A prophecy that Jesus would be a ruler and law giver who would come out of the tribe of Judah (Gen. 49:10).
- (d) Moses tells Israel that Jesus will be a prophet similar to himself (Deut. 18:15, 18).
- (e) David is particularly told that Jesus will proceed out of h's kingly family—and will sit upon his throne. This points to the Millenial.
- (f) Isaiah startles our wildest imagination by declaring that Jesus will be more than a great man—but actually the Mighty God Himself (Isa. 7:14; 9:6).
- (g) Isaiah further makes it clear that a pure virgin will bring Jesus into the world—and not an ordinary wife bringing her husband's son into the world.
- (h) And Micah in particular puts his finger on the town wherein the Christ-child is to be born (Micah 5:2).

Gabriel, one of the Archangels, is secretly dispatched by God unto a wicked city called Nazareth of Galilee. He is sent to speak to a pure little maiden called Mary. Mary is engaged to marry Joseph who was of the house of David.

Mary was no doubt in the house for Gabriel came in unto her and said, "Hail thou that art highly favored, the Lord is with thee: blessed are thou among women."

Mary was startled by this sudden announcement. It troubled her exceedingly. She reasoned in her heart and mind what kind of greetings this salutation could be.

As she pondered Gabriel said, "Fear not Mary: for thou hast found favour with God."

It is a silly notion to call Mary Mother of God.

She was flesh and blood and of human descent. When Gabriel spoke to her she was just a frightened little Judahite maiden who expected to get married to a man she loved called Joseph.

To this pure woman Gabriel announced the most tremendous truth that had heretofore been uttered: "thou shalt conceive in thy womb, and bring forth a

Several months later Caesar Augustus sent forth a decree that all of the Roman empire which included Palestine should be enrolled in a census. Cyrenius, the governor of Syria, having charge of census in the Palestinian area of Galilee, sent the edict forth in his territory. It was necessary that each person return to his own city to be enrolled.

Joseph and Mary, being of the house and lineage of David, returned to Bethlehem, the city of David. Joseph, as you know, took Mary to be his wife even though she was with child; a child not his. As Matthew records: "Joseph, her husband, being a just man, and not willing to make her a public example, was minded to put her away privily. But while he thought on these things, behold, the angel of the Lord appeared unto him in a dream saying, Joseph, thou Son of David, fear not to take unto thee Mary thy wife: for that which is conceived in her is of the Holy Ghost and she shall bring forth a son, and thou shalt call his name Jesus: for He shall save his people from their sins."

self a sermon of conviction. He told himself that it would be better to be a servant in his father's house than to perish in hunger.

A backslider should be willing to take the lowest place in God's house and some will never get back simply because they are not willing to take that place. If they were willing to take that place, God would give them something much better; but let us listen as the prodigal son talks to himself:

"And when he come to himself, he said, How many hired servants of my father's have bread enough and to spare, and I perish with hunger! I will arise and go to my father, and will say unto him, Father, I have sinned against heaven, and before thee, And am no more worthy to be called thy son; make me as one of thy hired servants.

"And he arose, and came to his father. But when he was yet a great way off, his father saw him, and had compassion, and ran, and fell on his neck, and kissed him. And the son said unto him, Father, I have sinned against heaven, and in thy sight, and am no more worthy to be called thy son.

"But his father said to his servants, Bring forth the best robe, and put it on him; and put a ring on his hand, and shoes on his feet; And bring hither the fatted calf, and kill it; and let us eat, and be merry: For this my son was dead, and is alive again; he was lost, and is found."

What a wonderful reconciliation!

Here you have all the essential elements of the restoration of a wayward son of God.

His own will took him out of God's will, and away from his father's house. Isaiah said, "All we, like sheep, have gone astray; we have turned everyone to his own way." Do you remember the blessings that you found in the house of God? How sweet is the fellowship of the saints when brethren dwell together in unity and love.

He hungered for the bread of his father's table. Do you too, hunger for the Word of God, and for the ministry of this blessed bread of life?

Then, the prodigal son determined to do something about it. There are some folk who think that they cannot get back to God because they do not know what to do. But most of them do not get back to God simply because they will not do what they know.

This man said, I will rise and go. I'll go to my father's house, and there I'll find him. Some folk just want to write him a letter, or call him by phone. But no, I'll arise and go to my father. I'll find him at his house.

A backslider called me recently by phone and asked if they could be restored if they would make a confession by telephone. The person was a member of another congregation. But I said, no, don't tell me what you have done. Go back to your church. Go to your pastor. Tell him that you have wandered from God. He can restore you back to the fold, and God will take you back into His love.

The prodigal condemned himself. He offered no defense. No excuses. His father freely forgave him, and he was justified.

As long as a backslider justifies himself, GOD cannot justify him: but, when a wanderer comes back to his senses, and says, I have sinned, then he is on the road that leads back to God and peace.

"He that confesseth his sin, and forsaketh his sin, shall obtain mercy."

Speaking in Jongues

AS THE EVIDENCE OF THE BAPTISM IN THE HOLY SPIRIT

(continued from page 8)

Let me relate one reason more why I believe that the speaking with other tongues is the evidence of the Baptism. We have fellowship with all believers who love the Lord Jesus, and yet the Pentecostal movement is strangely ostracized by the churches. In spite of the fact that some hundreds of thousands of people have already received the Holy Spirit, speaking with other tongues, and also that the speaking with other tongues is in exact conformity to the Word of God, the churches have opposed this movement. The opposition is exceedingly strong. For no other reason than that the person has spoken with tongues, has many an individual been excommunicated from a church, and yet there is no scripture to justify such an action, but rather to condemn it, for it expressly says: "Forbid not to speak with tongues."

Why should so vigorous an opposition arise against the speaking with tongues? If the churches that oppose the Pentecostal movement conformed themselves to the New Testament pattern and sought for the speaking with other tongues and received the like gift, their opposition would be the more forceful, but outside the Pentecostal movement, there is to be found hardly a single individual who has received the infilling of the Spirit with this initial evidence. The keenness of the opposition makes one appreciate therefore the importance of the experience.

Either the speaking with other tongues is absolutely and undeniably the evidence of the Holy Spirit's indwelling, or it is absolutely and undeniably a counterfeit of God's gift! One must either be for it or against it. If we should deny the speaking with other tongues as the evidence of the Baptism, we should be in fellowship at once with those who oppose this movement. In accepting the evidence, we are cut off from the churches at large. Which course shall we take?

The first thing we have to do is to search the Word of God and order our lives accordingly. In the Scripture, it clearly states that on the day of Pentecost, when the Holy Spirit fell, the disciples in the Upper Room were all filled with the Spirit and began to speak with other tongues as the Spirit gave them utterance.

Nor is this incident in Acts 2 an isolated experience. When Peter went down to Caesarea and preached to Cornelius and his household, the Holy Spirit

fell on all of them that heard; and those who accompanied Peter were astonished because on the Gentiles also was poured out the gift of the Holy Spirit. "For they heard them speak with tongues, and magnify God" (Acts 10:46).

Again when Paul met certain disciples at Ephesus who had not been filled with the Holy Spirit, he laid hands on them, and the Holy Spirit came on them; "and they spake with tongues, and prophesied" (Acts 19:6).

And Paul, in 1 Corinthians 14, reminds us that in Isaiah it is written, "With men of other tongues and other lips will I (the Lord) speak unto this people." When we refer to this passage in Isaiah 28 we note the Lord's comment on this manifestation: "This is the rest . . . and this is the refreshing." And further, the Lord in Isaiah 28:12 foretells the present attitude of Christendom toward this manifestation: "Yet they would not

We therefore take our stand on the side of revealed truth and claim that those who receive the like experience as the Apostles did at the beginning, are baptized with the Holy Spirit.

We are not willing to deny ourselves; we love self to the exclusion of God. God calls to us and speaks to us through his messengers but we continually fight and rebel against His word. Oh, what miserable and abject failures we make of our lives when we try to guide our own ship without the help of Christ, our pilot.
