There is a mistaken idea in the minds of some saints that after repentance, water baptism in His name and the infilling of the Holy Ghost with the physical evidence of speaking with other tongues, that that is all that is necessary to qualify for the rapture.

This conclusion has caused many a soul to become careless and lukewarm, still depending upon a past experience. We all know that Acts 2: 38 is essential to enter into the Kingdom of God, but the Kingdom of God is not the final step of God's plan for our redemption. Until we are tucked safely away in the city of God with a body like unto His glorious body, we are still not secure.

EPHESIANS 1: 13---Take a Good Look!

Take a careful look at Eph. 1: 13 & 14
"..ye were sealed with that Holy Spirit of promise. Which is the earnest (first payment or first step in the final act of redemption) of our inheritance UNTIL the redemption of the purchased possession (our bodies) unto the praise of His glory."

As long as we are here on earth, there is no stopping place. I do not mean there is another salvation, but without doubt we all need to grow in grace..also "we all, with open face beholding as in a glass the glory of the Lord, are changed into the same image from glory to glory even as by the Spirit of the Lord."

Paul is telling these Ephesians that the baptism of the Holy Ghost is only the earnest of our inheritance and that we are not really saved until the rapture. Every saint should be deeply impressed by this truth.

HONEST PRESSURE ON OURSELVES

The Holy Spirit of promise is the first step to heaven or the rapture. Then comes mortifying or "self-slaying" these weaknesses in our flesh. Namely, anger, wrath, malice and such like and unless these lusts in our bodies are conquered, we will never experience the redemption of "the purchased possession" (rapture). That is why Paul told the Colossians to "mortify therefore your members fornication, uncleanness, inordinate affection, evil concupiscence and covetousness." Brethren, these things can rise in any saint. They are there...enemies, just waiting to destroy us. Paul is writing to Colossian saints, not sinners. We are wise to recognize these possibilities. Thank God we have power to conquer them the same as a man who has repented can receive the Holy Ghost, if he really seeks God with all his heart. Even the mighty Apostle stated he had no confidence in his flesh. We are only debtors to the Holy Spirit of God within us. Only those led by His Spirit are His sons.

The sinner has great joy when he receives the Holy Ghost. So also, the saint will have such joy at the rapture that eye hath not seen nor ear heard. Let us be wise and not fools. The city of God is close at hand.

"HE THAT IS FAITHFUL IN THAT WHICH IS LEAST IS FAITHFUL ALSO IN MUCH; AND HE THAT IS UNJUST IN THE LEAST IS UNJUST ALSO IN MUCH. IF THEREFORE YE HAVE NOT BEEN FAITHFUL IN THE UNRIGHTEOUS MAMMON, WHO WILL COMMIT TO YOUR TRUST THE TRUE RICHES?" Luke 16: 10, 11

There are true riches which God wants to give us if we are faithful to Him. True riches are those "additional" gifts---physical or spiritual, peace of heart, money, blessings, respect, accomplishment, position and riches which we would not ordinarily receive. God has promised to open the windows of heaven and pour out blessings to us that we shall not be able to receive. If we are not faithful in money (tithing to the house of God) we will not receive the true riches which He has in store for us.

One tenth of what we earn is not ours. It belongs to God. Actually, everything we have comes from our Lord. If we do not use his goods wisely, he may dismiss us, as the lord in Luke 16 was going to do to the steward.

The 16th chapter of Luke tells us of a steward who had been careless and wasteful of his lord's goods. Because of this he was going to lose his job. He began to use money to make friends. By doing this he was looking ahead to the time when he would have to have a place to live. He thought if he was kind to others, perhaps they would have mercy upon him should he lose his job. He asked each of his lord's debtors how much they owed. After he found out the amount owed, he cut their bill. The first debtor owed one hundred measures of oil. The steward allowed him to pay fifty. Another debtor owed a hundred measures of wheat. The steward allowed him to pay eighty measures.

Of course this made the steward have friends. If a carnal man would like us for a dollar, how much more God will like us if we give Him our tithes and offerings.

This steward was wise enough to make friends so that if he was dismissed from his position as a steward, he would still have a habitation.

Instead of the owner dismissing him, he commended him. If the steward was that wise to make friends with money, the rich man was convinced that the steward could make money for him.

Very few people lose out with God who are faithful in their tithing.

If you had a friend who was always giving you money or gifts, you would love him. More than likely, if that friend ever got into trouble or some difficulty you would help him out or give him money. So it is with God. If we are faithful in the least, with our tithing, God will be faithful to us. He never fails.

Many are under the impression that tithing is under the Law; but Genesis 28: 22 tells us that Jacob, when he saw the vision, promised to give God one tenth. This also was before the Law.

The Jews were the only nation who would pay tithes. Because they did pay tithes, God has blessed them since.

MEN TEACHERS IN THE SUNDAY SCHOOL?

"Seriously, Dot, in our Sunday Schools all through the lower grades and in the younger classes our teachers are usually women. People seem to think because women rear children that they qualify as teachers of this greatest of all subjects, religion. 'Women understand children,' the men say. Many women are willing to teach, but understanding this greatest-of-all subject, religion, and understanding the teaching process--how to teach--are necessary also."

"But," countered Dot, "doesn't it seem natural that women take care of little children better than men?"

"Take care of them?" questioned Jan. "Yes, but it would help to have men in the classrooms of even the smallest children."

"Men? What could they do with the small children?" asked Dot surprisedly. "Why, my husband would be all thumbs! He wouldn't know what to do. Besides, that really looks weak to me. It seems to me that men can help in building and remodelling the church--but teaching little children? No, Jan," disagreed Dot.

"Take Harold, my husband, for instance, about the only thing he did successfully when our children were small was telling them stories and listening to their prayers at night!"

"Well, Dot, wouldn't those things fit right into Sunday School teaching? What about a man and wife team in a class? I know one church that employs such methods and when we asked little three-year old Beth what her teacher's name was, she said proudly, 'My teacher's name is Alice--and my other teacher's name is Charlie!' Both could teach! Is there anything in books on pedagogical methods which says that two teachers cannot teach? No! One could tell the Bible lesson and aid with the work to be done, the co-teacher could tell the illustrative story, lead in prayer or drill in the memory verses. There need be no difficulties concerning the teacher status of the two. They both teachers!"

"It sounds good, Jan, but are you off the subject? Weren't we discussing teen-age boys in our Sunday Schools--and why there are so few?"

"The reason being," insisted Jan, "that they haven't been asked. No one has explained to them the importance of men being associated with the Sunday School as teachers. Perhaps no correlation between lack of men teachers and loss of young men in the church has been pointed out to the men. If men predominate in our world and culture, why should they not take that same part in the church?"

"There are some men, perhaps older ones, who would not care to take the whole load of a class, but they could step into classes perhaps twice a month and tell very good Bible stories or life-experience stories with a good moral. Some of those men have a world of knowledge that could be shared with our children. We are robbing our children of some mighty good talent, it seems to me," said Jan.

"What would we do with all the women, then? Men are so rough, Jan, and women have more patience in teaching. Men claim that they can't 'stand a bunch of kids' for over a half-hour. You know how it is."

"Don't worry, Dot. The women will have plenty to do. Remember, I didn't say to push the ladies out of the classes. I said to add men to the classes. The women will still have plenty to do. I have already mentioned the man and wife team for a lower age group. Perhaps we could retain a woman as a teacher and have a man as an assistant. If the man insists he cannot teach, perhaps he can aid in workbooks or handcraft. At least we'd have a man in the classroom. The children's church is another area where men can be active."

"The principle involved, let me repeat," said Jan, "is that of es-

tablishing the church and Sunday School as a strong endeavor, by using men as teachers or aids.

"Oh, I see," Dot quickly added, "You want to develop an attitude of respect for the church in the minds of our boys--not attendance out of fear."

"That's right--you have it! If the church is to go on we must save, train, and use our teenagers for its perpetuation. How I long that our churches might be strong, 'terrible as an army with banners' as the Bible states. The power of God present, the Word of God taught, the Gospel lived, so as to make our churches powerful!"
